NNPS Professional Development Activities - September 2025

Awareness Session - September 9

NNPS Awareness Session contrasts the "old way" of thinking about school, family, and community partnerships and the "new way" based on many years of NNPS research. We guide state, region, and district leaders for partnerships to understand and implement proven structures and processes that enable all schools to welcome all families to increase student success. The Awareness Session helps leaders at all policy levels get "on the same page" to organize their programs and practices of family and community engagement.

Many attending the *Awareness Session* explained why the information was important, including:

- The NNPS framework of six types of involvement makes it easy to share examples of how to improve family engagement.
- I think linking family engagement activities to goals for student learning is most important for my district and all schools.

- The topic of equity—engage all families not a few—is most important because our district is very diverse in languages, cultures, and other ways. And right now reaching all families is a challenge.
- Most important is shifting family engagement from who comes to PTA meetings to how everyone can help students meet goals in our School Improvement Plan.
- This is a challenge because our immigrant families are wary of governmental institutions—which includes schools.
- This was an excellent program!
- Changing from "parent involvement" to "school, family, and community partnerships" tells that everyone has a role to play to support student success. For us that included teachers, cafeteria workers, bus drivers... everyone!

Quarterly Meeting: Let's Talk about Partnerships – September 18

The first quarterly support session for the 2025-26 school year—*Let's Talk about Partnerships*—enabled leaders to meet NNPS and each other to communicate about important issues and exchange ideas about best practices and challenges they face to improve programs of school, family, and community partnerships.

NNPS discussed why Professional Development Partners should reach out to invite their staff and colleagues in other departments to attend NNPS sessions with them. This will increase understanding and support to strengthen programs of family and community engagement. With collegial support, state, region, and district leaders will know that *their work is valued by others* and that *they do not have to work alone*. Remember: NNPS does not charge registration fees for colleagues to attend our workshops and meetings with Professional Development Partners.

The Let's Talk session included a breakout activity for small groups of leaders to Meet Each Other! Think Together! and to discuss two topics: (1) Share a best practice; (2) Discuss an emerging challenge. This generated good discussions among attendees. Here are a few reactions from attendees:

- I learned about the advantages of partnerships and want to know more about the most effective resources to communicate with parents.
- I learned how different districts use incentives to help schools engage their families.

Leadership Institute – September 25

The Leadership Institute is a major NNPS workshop to guide state, region, and district leaders to make room in their busy schedules to "coach" or "facilitate" schools' Action Teams for Partnerships (ATPs). School teams (i.e., parents, teachers, administrators, and others) need to know that their district leaders are experts who will guide the ATP to improve the school's partnership program and practices.

Leaders learn to schedule LEADERSHIP and FACILITATION activities. "Leadership activities" refer to the leaders' work on partnerships that benefits their whole state, region, or district. "Facilitation" refers to the coaching and support that state and regional leaders conduct with district leaders for partnerships, and that district leaders conduct to help their schools' ATPs improve partnerships with their own students' families. By distributing leadership in this way, programs at all policy levels—state, region, district, and school—will continually improve.

In two breakout activities, NNPS Professional Development Partners talked with others about how they worked to LEAD and FACILITATE partnerships in their locations.

Attendees were listening. Here are a few comments:

- Chatting with others was very useful—particularly to learn what they found most useful about the model.
- I learned to problem solve challenges so that folks can join all the wonderful PD and collaboration opportunities that I am planning.


2. NEW THIS YEAR! Talk Time with Brenda – An Open Office Hour.
